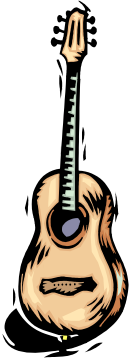

CHURCH NEWS

Mum's the Word ...

Many of you will know that in England, since at least the 17th Century, the Fourth Sunday of Lent is known as "Mothering Sunday". Historically it was a day when servants were given the day off and encouraged to return to their homes and spend time with their mothers, often taking with them a special cake, known as a Simnel Cake. Even today, children often make a special effort to return to the family home to celebrate with their mothers or, at the very least, to send a card home.

Parenthood isn't something any of us is really trained for, though is it? We fly by the "seat of our pants", don't we - and we often get it wrong, despite what we read in all those books and newspaper columns!

This year, Mothering Sunday falls on 14th March, and I wonder if it might be appropriate for us to acknowledge both the good and the bad experiences people have regarding motherhood generally. If we don't, then there's the danger that we end up not talking about "the elephant in our living room". At the very least we should face both our positive and negative experiences, bringing to mind those whose mothers were abusive, neglectful or addicted - or who enabled fathers to be like that; those who grew up in single-parent families, or who never got the chance to know a mother or father; those who have not been able, for whatever reason, to form adult relationships with their parents; those who wish they could become parents but can't; those wanting and waiting to adopt; those fortunate enough to have adoptive parents who loved them; children of extended families with step-parents; those who had an abortion long ago and now feel torn by it (yes, we really do need to acknowledge that there are people on both sides of the abortion issue who are in pain). Spare a thought too for those who never had an opportunity to become mothers, and those who have had to "mother" their own elderly, crippled, parents or parents suffering from dementia. And there are bound to be other situations I haven't touched upon. Mothering Sunday can indeed bring to the surface many raw emotions and painful memories.

In bringing all these things to mind, and in our prayers, let us remember – each one of us (regardless of whether or not we are a parent, single or married, male or female) should play our part in upholding an ideal Christian family life. Being human, we can only ever hope to partially meet that standard ... and then only with God's grace ... but be assured, that grace is there for the asking, in our prayers, if we only have the mind and will to do so.

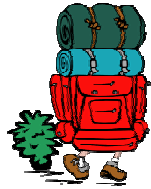

The Churchyard

There has been an increasing number of artificial flowers, containers, toys and shrubs appearing in our churchyards over the past few weeks and months. There are very strict rules concerning church burial grounds generally (as opposed to Council operated ones), and these are set out in Churchyard Regulations, a copy of which will be available to read in each of our churches. A few people have commented on how unsightly the churchyards are becoming. In addition, maintenance of the churchyards becomes a much more difficult job, meaning more time has to be spent on grass cutting, leading to increased costs. Because it is not always possible for us to identify graves in order to speak with surviving family members, may we ask, please, that all prohibited items are removed from gravesides by the end of March? Your co-operation will be very much appreciated. In the meantime, of course we understand that there may be real pastoral issues in individual cases so please do contact the Vicar if that would help (827285).

FROM ROY...

My personal devotions recently reminded me that when we wish to rob people of their dignity, we strip their clothes from them. Our disgust of torture is partly that it often involves stripping the victim naked and leaving them feeling vulnerable.

And so I am led to the foot of Christ's cross. Before the soldiers crucify Jesus, they remove his clothes. In at least one of the gospel accounts, we are told that they gamble for who will get to keep his clothes. Then in great shame Jesus is crucified and with intense suffering he dies. All human dignity is taken from him.

The events of Good Friday remind us that Jesus' whole ministry was spent among people who had lost their dignity – the poor, the exploited, the forgotten and the despised. Through his ministry, Jesus proclaimed that God was with them to restore their dignity. Finally, at the cross, stripped of all his own dignity, we see God's deep concern for our dignity meets with our human indignity in Christ. Where all sense tells us that God is absent, the crucified Christ reveals that God has not given up on us.

There are times when I despair of what we humans do to each other. There are times when I am still shocked by the indignities we inflict on each other. It is then that I return to the cross to be reminded that God never gives up on affirming our human dignity. God goes on challenging me to recognise the dignity of all his children. God forgives and renews me when I rob others of their dignity.

WEA Basic Technology Group

Is there anyone out there who is not confident about using a mobile phone in an emergency? Or who would like to send a text to a grandchild or a TV station, but who doesn't like to bother their friends or family to show them how (again!).

The WEA is encouraging the formation of small self-help groups, and I would like to start one to tackle some of the baffling modern technological innovations, starting with the easiest and perhaps working our way up to the dizzy heights of an i-pod, depending on what people would like to master.

There would be no 'experts' as such. I anticipate that to begin with, if we get stuck, we might look at an instruction book together and if that is total gobbledegook we might call on some kindly person who does know what to do to help us solve the problem. SEEND AND DISTRICT GARDENING CLUB



Having cancelled Alison Peterson in January due to the icy conditions in Rusty Lane we were lucky enough to re-book her for 9th February as the programmed speaker cancelled us for the second time. Her talk was entitled Organic Pest Control, which could have been rather dry but turned out to be very interesting and informative.

Alison was an organised and clear speaker with a strong sense of humour, who instantly appealed to our members and has been booked for next season already! She told us that controlling pests was often down to common sense in the garden starting with knowing friends from foes. Only 2% of the insects in our gardens are pests, the rest are either harmless or beneficial. To ward off the 2% ensure that your soil is fertile, that you grow resistant varieties of plants, grow plants that attract pest predators and provide habitats for them, practise crop rotation if growing veg, grow plants in the right places so they are not stressed and use good hygiene, cleaning pots in soapy water and cleaning and oiling tools each time you use them. I'm afraid I often don't even put mine away. Then you protect your plants by using barriers of dried and crushed egg shells, bran, coffee grounds, netting, fleece or cloches. As you go round your garden, rub aphids off leaves with your fingers, pick off caterpillars and slugs and dispose of them. I think her phrase was rub, pick and crush. Use beer traps (yoghourt pots) for slugs and snails. The resulting goo can be put on the compost heap. Rats apparently hate the smell of peppermint so stew mint leaves, leave for a couple of days, strain and water their runs and favourite places. Or scatter crushed Polo mints instead. You can make a garlic spray by putting 4 or 5 cloves in water, leave for a couple of weeks and then spray plants with the liquid. Chillies might work the same way. So with your garden smelling of peppermint, garlic and chillies you will probably get rid of your neighbours as well. The most interesting fact of the evening was that pests like aphids have an accelerated breeding cycle, giving birth to pregnant young so they recover quickly from chemical insecticides.

In the notices David told us that he has now finalised arrangements for a trip to Cranborne on Thursday 15th July. A list will be out soon.

Next month Dawn Collins is returning to talk on 'The Path to Paradise. A journey through the Stourhead landscape.' This will be followed in May by a guided walk with Dawn round the garden. Lots of things **coming up** - Dugout supper, folk night, charity disco, National Trust lecture - see events section at the beginning of this magazine for details.

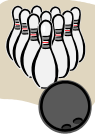
Nosh & Natter

Letter received from Wiltshire Council concerning a review undertaken of existing **speed limits on A & B roads**. Roads affected in the Seend area are:

A361 from the Strand to C226 junction – meets criteria for 50 mph

A365 from the 40 mph limit in Sells Green to Seend Fork – meets criteria for 50 mph

PC Emily Thomas has contacted the Transportation Planning Team and Highways Dept following the recent **accident at the A361 crossroads** by the Bell Inn, to assess the situation and check out the road signage.

Letter from Wiltshire Council concerning **grit bins** located within parishes, enclosing a map, asking that the bins be surveyed and a note made of their condition, and whether further bins are needed. This has now been done, advising that two bins shown on the map are missing, and requesting two further bins at the entrance to The Lye and at the top of Inmarsh, near the entrance to Turners Farm.

PC Emily Thomas had sent a **Farm Bulletin**. There is concern about Land Rover Defender thefts, in October 2009 eight were taken in one month. There have been other thefts of 4 x 4 vehicles as well. There have been 20 incidents of hare coursing. Theft from farms of Cotswold stone and bales of hay, and the Police are expecting thefts of fuel and metal to rise.

Letter received from Seend PCC concerning **Seend War Memorial**. There has been some talk about the possible re-siting of the memorial that is located at the entrance to the Churchyard, to a more prominent position within the village. This has been discussed by the Royal British Legion, the Community Centre and the Lye Field Committee, who agree that re-location would be worthwhile. A suggested site is the south edge of the Lye Field. The letter asks that the Parish Council take this matter forward. The PCC are perfectly happy for the War Memorial to remain in the Churchyard should the village wish it to. The PC discussed possible sites, including the entrance to Dial Close and top of Love Lane. It was agreed that this would be placed on the agenda for discussion at the Annual Parish Meeting, so that parishioners could attend and voice their views.

The proposed **Marina at Foxhangers** will have an impact on Seend, including canal use and parking. Wiltshire Council to be advised that Seend PC wish to comment on the application.

It was agreed that contact details for the Parish Clerk would be displayed on all notice boards.

The Melksham Area Board goes from strength to strength. I really enjoy Chairing and working with the Councillors and the officers who support the Board. Board meetings will move around the Area and the next meeting is in Melksham at the Rachel Fowler Centre on Wednesday 24th March at 6.30. The meeting after that will be in Seend Community Centre on Wednesday 26th May. Members of the public are welcome at Area Board meetings so do come along and see what goes on.

In Seend I have recently had a very positive meeting with Mr Sherman from Spiderweb Paddock and I hope that this will help to resolve difficulties. I have also been helping with the grant for play area refurbishment at the Lye Field. In Bulkington we recently had a detailed and highly productive meeting in Keevil Village Hall where the Highways and Drainage Engineers outlined the results of their flood and gully surveys to the Parish Flood Warden and Chairs of Parish Councils. The engineers then gave very welcome details of all the work that they will be doing to make the flow of water work in both Keevil and Bulkington.

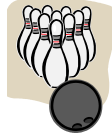
