

CHRISTIAN AID WEEK Sunday 12th - Saturday 18th May

Christian Aid, with 70 years experience, works to bring an end to poverty in 37 countries, helping people in Africa, Asia and the Middle East as well as Latin America and the Caribbean, addressing the root causes as well as the effects of poverty. They work with 475 local, national & international partner organizations, some are Christian, some Muslim, Jewish or Hindu – some are of no religious persuasion at all. Christian Aid's primary concern is that partners are good at what they do. The work is inspired by Christian values of faith, charity, hope and truth. Put simply 'aid' is what Christian Aid does, 'Christian' is why they do it."

Christian Aid makes best use of monies collected by allocating funds from a central budget to partners according to need. A close relationship is maintained with partners to learn more about the problems in their areas, to offer support and check that money is spent wisely.

Over a quarter of the money collected is spent on emergencies. But the key area is long term development spending nearly half of the income, on projects such as education and health as well as ways to improve people's resilience to shocks and disasters, like stronger houses in earthquake zones. The remainder is divided between campaigning and fundraising. No money is given to governments.

The focus of this year's Christian Aid week is on maternal and child health in Sierra Leone. A decade of civil war in the 1990s and especially the ebola outbreak 2014 – 2016 have led to it being the most dangerous place to give birth.1 in 17 women die in child birth, about the UK level in the early 1700s and three times the maternal mortality average for sub-Saharan Africa. Nearly all of the problems can be treated successfully with basic interventions.

A Christian Aid envelope is inside this Spotlight; please keep it safely. The collectors will call during the week of $12^{th} - 18th$ May. It helps them considerably and is more convenient to you if the donation is ready when they call. I appreciate it is a nuisance but if you pay income tax please complete the Gift Aid slip too, it increases your amount to Christian Aid by 25% at no extra cost to yourself. Then tear off the slip, place inside the envelope, moisten the strip at the top of the envelope and fold. If you are on holiday during Christian Aid week or miss your collector for any other reason, please hand your envelope in at the village Shop in Seend or to Liz Futter, Mill Lane, Bulkington or to me at Whites Farm, Seend Cleeve, whichever is the most convenient.

Annual Parish Meeting

The Annual Parish Meeting will be taking place on Monday 20th May at 7.30pm at the Irene Usher Memorial Pavilion. Refreshments will be available from 7pm. All parishioners are invited to attend. Seend clubs and organisations are invited to give a short summary of their year's activities.

Metro Count Results - Seend High Street

This was undertaken between 4th and 10th February 2019 along the High Street between the Lye Field and the Manor House. Speeds for a total of 28,962 vehicles in free flowing traffic in both directions were recorded. Total traffic volume during this period was 47,519 vehicles (this figure may be higher than above due to congestion when 'free-flowing' speeds cannot be recorded. The 85th percentile speed was 34.6mph (the speed at or below which 85% of the traffic is travelling). The average speed was 30.6 mph.

The results mean that because the speeds were under 35mph, the criteria for taking further action, there can be no community speed watch or police enforcement. We will not be able to install a speed indicator device.

The Parish Council appreciates that the results will be disappointing for residents, but we cannot request any further action to be taken by Wiltshire Police or Wiltshire County Council Highways regarding speed enforcement or management based on these results.

SEEND PARISH NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN STEERING GROUP May Update

You may remember that during late summer last year, letters were sent to everyone in the Parish asking for comments on the short list of suggested **local green spaces**. This was to collect evidence on whether the spaces are special to the community, and to ask for suggestions for any green spaces, which had been missed.

For a space to be eligible, it has to be particularly important locally with regard to beauty, wildlife, tranquillity, recreation or historic significance. It must also be small, not an 'extensive' area and in, or near, to the community which uses it.

Suggestions were also made at the coffee morning in January. The group have assessed these against national planning policy criteria, and found the **green space** at the junction of the High Street and Dial Close is one which could potentially meet the criteria. We are now gathering evidence from nearby residents to help consider its value to the community. If you also value this green space as part of our High Street scene, please register your support on our website 'Comments' page.

We are also undertaking the next stage of consultation in this exercise, by making contact with landowners of the other suggested **local green spaces**. They can comment or object to the proposed **local green space** designation, and their response(s) will form part of the evidence base on which the Steering Group will decide whether to recommend spaces for designation.

The decision will ultimately be up to the Examiner of our draft Neighbourhood Plan. The decision will be based on all of the evidence and information gathered ~ hence the importance of your views.

I repeat last month's appeal for **your suggestions** in establishing a **List of Local Heritage Assets**. This is a way of identifying buildings, structures, sites or landscapes which do not quite meet the criteria for being nationally listed, but which are still of architectural or historical importance in their local area. We can identify and map our Parish's locally important heritage assets within our Neighbourhood Plan to ensure that planning decisions that directly affect them or their setting are taken into account.

Identification of a Local Heritage Asset in our Parish does not change the existing planning controls that already apply to a building. However, local heritage listing means that the interest of the building or site will be at least a "material consideration" during the planning process.

Historic England sets out criteria to inform what could be appropriate for the list:

Rarity: This can include unusual assets such as traditional signage or industrial relics

Representativeness: Representative of a particular architectural period, architect, movement, company or group of its time, for example railway, Victorian and industrial.

Architectural interest: Of importance in its architectural design, decoration or craftsmanship

Townscape value: walls, fences, railings, street surfaces (including cobbles, setts and grass verges), street furniture.

Group value: Groupings of assets with a clear visual, design or historic relationship (including farmyard and terraces)

Artistic interes: An asset with artistic interest exhibiting some degree of creative skill (including sculpture, decoration, gates, railings, door surrounds, finials and signage)

Historic association: Associated with an historical person or event of acknowledged note (including important local figures or events).

On our website you will find a Local Listing Nomination Form, or you can simply email your idea via the Contacts page. (www.seendparishplan.org).

Once we have a shortlist for the Seend Parish Local Heritage List we will share it with you and undertake consultation with any owners who may be able to provide valuable information, which can influence the decision about whether to add the asset to the Local Heritage List.

All are welcome at the monthly open meetings. The next Committee Meeting will be Thursday 25th April at 7.30pm. in the Community Centre. There will be no open Committee Meeting in May, but there is the PC Village AGM at which Georgina A'Bear will report on our progress. (Some members of the SG meet again between these open meetings to progress the background work, together with our Consultants).

CHURCH AND CHAPEL NEWS

PASTORAL LETTER

I recently took a short break around the North Norfolk Coastline, where I spent the time mostly walking. It was bliss, being so very close to nature what with trees already in blossom, hares leaping through the fields, the joyful sound of birdsong, the already fading daffodils now interspersed with cowslips, primroses and early bluebells, carpeting the soil, and ... well, it was as good as it ever gets. Cecil Rhodes once said "To be born British is to win first prize in the lottery of life." How right! One of my walks took me to the village of Burnham Thorpe, Nelson's reputed

birthplace, and his childhood home. His father, Edmund, had been a long-time rector of All Saints Church, where he was buried, in the chancel. I spent some time looking at the display of two flags from "The Victory" draped at the west end of church, an extract from "The Times" newspaper dated November 7th, 1805 reporting

that great man's death, as well as other memorabilia, and then continued on my way, walking in Nelson's steps on some of the local tracks. It was quite overwhelming. And then I got to thinking of the last time I was aware of walking in someone's steps – someone who had a much greater impact on our lives, whose life was sacrificed for us over 2000 years ago, and whose promised resurrection we celebrate each Easter Day.

In 2009 Dave and Ann Howard led a group of us to the Holy Land. I was deeply touched as we walked on the shores of Lake Galilee (experiencing a storm of our own whilst out on that Lake, one which came upon us so unexpectedly – dramatically even). We visited all those places that we read of in the Bible – the Mount of Olives, Nazareth, Bethlehem, the Garden of Gethsemane, Golgotha (the place of the crucifixion) – all this, and so much more, made everything we knew seem so real. It's impossible to describe the roller-coaster of thoughts and emotions that hit us during our time there, and which will remain with us forever. "Bah humbug" you might say, or, "How can you believe all those fairy stories?"

I once read it is good to question our faith. But let me leave you with just a few thoughts expressed by Leslie Weatherhead*.

- "How could a person too weak before his crucifixion to carry his cross, who had been scourged, tortured, nailed to a cross through the hot hours of a whole day, and into whose side a spear had been thrust ... get off a stone slab in the dark, remove his tightly wound wrappings or bandages, push back from the mouth of the cavetomb a heavy, grindstone shaped boulder ... which it took several strong men to move, evade the guards, procure from some unexplained source some clothing, and then appear to his friends ... as a man so fit that, in spite of two terrible wounds in his feet, he could, on the same day walk seven miles with two disciples, have supper with them, and then travel another seven miles to Jerusalem in time to meet the rest of his friends?"
- "If his friends had hidden the body it is incredible that no one ever divulged the secret as to where it lay. The new resting place would have been a venerated shrine, like Lenin's, but it would not have been the basis of a world faith in a risen Lord."
- It is made clear that the grave-clothes, covering the body up to the armpits had collapsed as if the body had evaporated" (and that) ... "not a fold of the 'linen cloths' was out of place and the turban was 'wrapped up in a place by itself' ... " (John 20:1-20)

To paraphrase a traditional aphorism, if you don't have faith, then there will never be evidence enough to convince you, and if you do have faith, no evidence is needed! Blessings

Dear Friends,

I expect most of you have forgotten about Easter now – and the chocolate is well and truly gone (tip: Easter Egg chocolate doesn't keep well, so you may as well just eat it up).

Sometimes Christians describe ourselves as 'Easter people' – meaning that, although we might forget the festival most of the year , we live our lives knowing that our belief in resurrection, that Jesus came alive again, changes everything. Whatever we individually believe about what actually happened that day when Jesus came back from the dead, it should make a difference every day to us.

This is how it works for me at least. Knowing Jesus rose from the dead means that death is not the final answer, whatever happens beyond death, for me it is not to be feared. Because of the resurrection there is hope for all sorts of situations to be sorted out ultimately. Because of the resurrection I live in real hope every day. I fully respect that this is one of the hardest things for those who believe and those who don't to accept – I can only say that it makes a difference to my life and to the lives of many others.

I am writing this a few days after the fire at Notre Dame de Paris. One of the interesting things I have read about this is that most if not all ancient cathedrals have lost their roofs, sometimes several times over the centuries. The stonework below is usually ok, if stained and marked, and the roof has been put back in time, allowing the worship space to be used again and the witness of ancient 'houses of God' to continue. The wonderful craftsmanship of architects and stonemasons and others means what seemed an utter disaster is resurrectable.

Sometimes though, when there is disaster something has to be rebuilt in another way, done in a different manner, rethought and rejigged. But the promise of resurrection –

of new life out of something that seems too terrible is available for so many situations, and for each one of us.

Life brings some really tough stuff to us all – and we can't see through to the other side of what seems to be the worst of life. God knows, through Jesus' humanity, what that feels like and walks with us through it. And God waits with us in the dark nights of despair and sorrow. And God is there too in the dawn, like the dawning of that first Easter Day, when it is still dark, although not as dark as things were, and the shape of a resurrected man can only be faintly seen in the gloom. And the hope of new life is always there – and God waits with us for it to arrive.

Parish Council

As you may be aware Bulkington has its own Emergency Planning Committee (EPC). There is also an Emergency Plan available to view on the Bulkington website and the aim is to manage the mobilisation of emergency responders to a range of possible emergencies within the Village. In support of the EPC a storage shed has been erected behind the Bus shelter which houses basic equipment to assist responders. The all up cost of the shed and equipment was £1500 and half of that amount was kindly met by the Melksham Area Board.

Two new waste bins have been installed along the most popular walks within the Village boundary and it is clear that they are being utilised. Many thanks to villagers for using them!

The Parish Council are looking at ways to improve facilities within the playing field. One suggestion is to erect items of robust outdoor gym equipment for use by adults/older children. Anyone wishing to support/object to such a project or submit an idea of their own is asked to email Amy.powell@bulkington-pc.co.uk

The War Memorial is in need of repair and this will take place in late Spring/early Summer. The work will be cosmetic and in keeping with the original materials including the use of lime mortar. Ideally the monument would be underpinned but this is cost prohibitive and includes the removal of the surrounding trees which is unacceptable.

SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

NB. The following minutes are a shortened version of the full minutes taken at the Parish Council meeting on 26th March 2019. These have not yet been ratified by the Parish Council and may be subject to change. A full copy of the minutes can be found on our website: www.seendparishcouncil.co.uk

The meeting held on 26th March was attended by eight Councillors with Mr James in the Chair, Councillor Jonathon Seed, Mrs Sue Bond (Clerk), Mr Peter Davey (Agent for The Old Station Yard) and one parishioner. There were two apologies.

<u>Local Councillor Matters</u> – <u>Electoral Review</u> – Councillor Seed said that he had questioned the relevance of the new name given to the Seend, Potterne and Poulshot division and had suggested that it might be better called the Devizes Rural West Division, so that it was more appropriate to all the other parishes that were to be put in this new division, ie Bulkington, Worton, Erelstoke, Marston and Coulston. As there were also divisions for Devizes North, Devizes South and Devizes East, it would make sense for the Seend division to be renamed Devizes Rural West. Councillors agreed that this would make sense. Clerk to submit a response to LGBCE. <u>Berhills Lane</u> - Cars and vans were still parking close to the junction of Berhills Lane and the A365. This is being monitored. <u>Leader of Wiltshire Council</u>, Baroness Scott has announced she is stepping down.

<u>Minutes and Matters Arising</u>: The Minutes of the 26th February meeting were approved.

<u>Litter Picking Equipment</u> - The Clerk reported that she had just received an email from Wiltshire Council with an offer to community groups to provide litter picking equipment for free as long as they provide details and photos of litter picking events that had been organised. Wiltshire Council had been awarded £86,956 share of £9.75m from the government to back their efforts in cleaning up our high streets and town

centres. Councillors thought this was an excellent opportunity to acquire some litter picking equipment for free and to be kept by the Parish Council.

<u>Bench at top of the Pelch</u> – The Clerk had got prices for some replacement oak slats and a price for them to be fixed in place by a local contractor. The Chairman would have a look at the bench first to see if it was simply a case of replacing the bolts. If not it was agreed that new slats be bought and for the local contractor to fix them in place. There was also a discussion of how all the benches around the village could be cleaned and treated. The Clerk to see if there is a volunteer willing to do this on a regular basis.

<u>Neighbourhood Plan</u> – The NPSG are still working on projects with the Consultants. Mrs Vince is in the process of completing the locality grant application and to give details of where all the monies were spent from the last grant. Their next meeting with the Consultants will be 18th April. They are getting closer to having statements ready to be approved by the Parish Council.

Highway Matters - Metro Count — The results had been received. The metro count was carried out between 4th and 10th February and had been placed between the Lye Field and the Manor House. The travel volume during the period was 47,519 vehicles, but that speeds were recorded for 28,962 vehicles in free-flowing traffic in both directions. The results showed that the 85th percentile was 34.6mph (the speed at or below which 85% of the traffic is travelling) The average speed was 30.6mph. Councillor Seed said that the results mean that no further action will be taken by Wiltshire Highways. We do not qualify for a Community Speed Watch scheme or to have a SID (speed indicator device) installed. Councillors appreciated that the results would be disappointing for the residents of the High Street. The results show that it is more of a perception of speeding rather than actual speeding.

<u>Church Crossing</u> – no news as to when the high friction coloured surface treatment would be carried out.

Planning Matters –

<u>Planning Ref: 19/01663/VAR</u> - Thatched Cottage, Baldham, Seend SN12 6PW Proposal: Variation of condition 3 of planning permission E/2011/1685/FUL to allow occupation of the annexed accommodation as a separate dwelling unit. All Councillors voted unanimously to refuse the planning application.

<u>Planning Ref: 19/02269/FUL - The Old Station Yard, Station Road, Seend SN12 6NG Proposal: Retrospection planning permission for the continued B2 and B8 use of the western land and for the siting of existing containers and structures. Mr Peter Davey, agent for the owner, explained the reasons for the planning application and the need for it to be approved in order for the next stage of their proposed re-development plans to be able to go before Wiltshire Council.</u>

All Councillors voted in favour.

Planning Ref: 19/02411/FUL - 54 Sells Green, Seend SN12 6PF

Proposal: Proposed single storey extension

All Councillors voted in favour.

<u>Planning Ref: 19/02967/TCA</u> – Nornour, High Street, Seend

Proposal: T1 Maple tree- reduce by 2.5m and reshape. T2 Conifer Tree – fell All Councillors voted in favour

<u>Constitution Updates</u> – Standing Orders, Code of Conduct, Financial Regulations, Internal Audit Report actions and Corporate Governance Questionnaire – All adopted.

<u>Correspondence</u> – <u>History Revealed Event</u> –Wiltshire & Swindon History Centre have organised a History Revealed event focussing on Seend. (*Details on p5. Ed.*)

Junior parkrun, Melksham – the Clerk had received an email from the leader of the Shaw & Whitley Beavers who is in the early stages of setting up a Junior parkrun to take place on Sunday mornings in Melksham. He is looking for help with set up funds to purchase a specialist computer and other equipment. The total funds needed are £3,000. Both Melksham Without PC and Melksham Town Council have agreed to provide some financial support on the condition that he also gets financial support from the 5 other parishes in the Melksham Area Board which includes Seend. Councillors agreed to make a contribution of £50.

NEWS FROM WILTSHIRE COUNCIL

What wonderful news that Salisbury has been voted the best place to live in the Country by Sunday Times readers. The City has had such a difficult year but Councillor Pauline Church and her Wiltshire Council Recovery Team have done an excellent (and award winning) job of getting the City back on its feet. This is being helped by ambitious plans from Wiltshire Council for development in the City as well as at-

tracting national events to Salisbury. The Council have produced a draft masterplan for the redevelopment of The Maltings and Central Car Park. It is also great to hear that businesses and organisations have shown their support for our Armed Forces by becoming sponsors and partners of this summer's Armed Forces Day National Event being held in Salisbury. The city is hosting the national event that honours and celebrates the Armed Forces, and veterans, and says thank you for all they do to protect us and keep our country safe. Armed Forces Day is traditionally marked across the UK on the last Saturday in June, this year it is 29 June. This year the event is being extended to three days from 28 to 30 June at Hudson's Field with a military parade in the city centre on the Saturday morning. Veterans and residents are urged to come and support our Armed Forces over the three day period of celebration in Salisbury.

In other areas of the County there is also positive news and helpful intervention from Wiltshire Council. The future of the North Wilts Rivers Route, a predominantly traffic-free cycling, walking and running path that links Chippenham to Calne, looks assured after Wiltshire Council reached agreement with the multiple landowners, who own sections of the route, to renew leases for the next five years. This is really good news for locals who value the route. In Devizes the long running saga of the future of the market place has finally been resolved to the satisfaction of all those involved. Initially there were plans to use the Market Place solely as a community space however following constructive feedback from businesses and residents a new agreement has been reached. So Devizes Market Place will have a dual role as a car park and community space following an agreement by council leaders from Town and County Halls.

All the above are examples of our communities and our Councillors pulling together to deliver the very best for us all. Often opinions differ but we in Wiltshire have a great reputation for bringing strong opinions together and finding solutions that benefit everyone. Now all we need to do is persuade our national politicians to do the same!
