

She's off again!

Not having suffered enough last year when the Vicar did a 496 mile sponsored walk to Santiago de Compostela from St Jean Pied de Porte (on the French side of the Pyrenees), she's off to SdC again – this time by the northern (coastal) route! Due to the constraints of time she will be walking around 16 days, so only a total of approximately 150 miles.

However the walk promises to be even more challenging, due to the terrain — mind you, walking over the Pyrenees was no picnic! Last year the sponsorship was for Help for Heroes and the Bishop of Salisbury's retirement appeal for a new theological college in Juba, Southern Sudan. The walk raised £2,500 and £250 for those causes respectively. This year sponsorship will be for a much more local cause — Seend School's new building fund! Many of you may know that the school needs to raise £32,000 over the next three years as part of the terms of the grant of £400,000 from the Diocese — no mean task. CHURCH AND CHAPEL NEWS

Pastoral preponderances ...

This is really hard for me. Here I am, writing this in early July (in order not to miss the deadline before going away for a couple of days or so on a reading break) for the magazine that's covering the months of August and September. Who knows what will happen during the weeks to come? Well, I <u>do</u> know there are four more weddings to celebrate in our villages, some baptisms, several fund-raising events and, towards the end of September, church harvest festivals.

Aah. Harvest Festivals eh? They're not like they used to be are they? I can remember, when I was a child, how the church was decorated with rows of bright shiny apples, wonderful displays of flowers all round, gifts of eggs, prize vegetables from gardens – and the home-made bread and rolls – and the best of all, the Harvest loaf in the shape of a sheaf of corn. The smell was out of this word as our nostrils were assaulted with all that wonderful God-given produce.

Well, sadly, things have changed a lot since those days. People grow less at home and not so many people keep chickens in their back gardens – and, generally speaking, people are more affluent and don't want gifts of the harvest produce. So in recent years churches have encouraged gifts of packaged and tinned food, that can then be passed on to agencies like the Devizes Food Bank instead, and that's a very good thing. Some other things haven't changed – we still sing the traditional harvest songs in church and services are on a "thanksgiving" theme, as is right and proper.

But what if it's been a poor harvest? What if things in your life haven't gone according to plan? Daniel Defoe gave us some good advice through his fictitious character Robinson Crusoe. The first thing that Crusoe did when he found himself on a deserted island was to make out a list. On one side of the list he wrote down all his problems. On the other side of the list he wrote down all of his blessings. On one side he wrote: I do not have any clothes. On the other side

he wrote: But it's warm and I don't really need any. On one side he wrote: All of the provisions were lost. On the other side he wrote: But there's plenty of fresh fruit and water on the island. And on down the list he went. In this way he discovered that for every negative aspect about his situation, there was a positive aspect, something to be thankful for. It's so easy to find ourselves on an island of despair. Is our cup half empty, or is it half full? Perhaps it's time we sat down and took an inventory of our blessings too, especially when things seem really bleak. I imagine there are plenty of people reading this article that are long, long overdue in expressing thanks to God. It would be a wonderful thing to see you at the thanksgiving services in our churches, but in the meantime you might give thanks today, and every day, remember your calling to be joyful always, to pray continually, and to give thanks in all circumstances. It is what God wants of you and for you. In it you will find the fullness of what God has in store for you. May he bless you richly.

<u>Lent and Holy Week Services – a Personal View</u>

Life as a Churchwarden is a busy one. I thought I knew what being a Churchwarden was all about, but until I became Churchwarden at St Peter's, I couldn't have been more wrong.

All the Churchwardens in the Benefice meet regularly at the Vicarage with Renée to discuss all matters from service planning, preparation for weddings, baptisms, social events in the Benefice, etc. etc. So as a Churchwarden I knew very early on what was happening throughout the Benefice during Lent and Holy Week. It seems we were going to be very busy. The first "extra" service was at St Peter's on Ash Wednesday. This was followed every Thursday with a Lent meeting which took place at a different church each week. These meetings took the form of readings, meditation and discussion. There were going to be just five of these meetings, but we found we wanted to continue so had one extra meeting. Was this going to be a trend – wanting more?!

Then of course there were the Lent Lunches – a great way to see people outside of our churches and enjoy good homemade soups and great company. If you haven't yet supported these Lent lunches, do try and make at least one next year. The money raised does not go to the churches but to our chosen charities. During Lent we take home boxes to save for the same charity, which this year was a local charity – Wiltshire Young Carers. This year over £300 was raised.

Next was Mothering Sunday which this year took place in The Old Rectory Hall. Attendance was very good, with children taking an active part in the service with reading and saying prayers. During the service posies were given to Mothers, Grandmothers etc - a lovely tradition that we intend to keep up.

All too soon was Palm Sunday where as usual we gathered at the farm and carrying our palms processed into church for a very good Palm Sunday Service. Then into Holy Week! Looking at the range of services on offer in the Benefice, it seems I would be 'all churched out' by Easter Day. How wrong could I have been. With a service of Compline at each of our three churches, then the Maundy Thursday service, including foot washing, the week was going by very quickly.



SEEND PARISH COUNCIL

The <u>Annual Parish Meeting</u> was held on 17th May 2011 at the Irene Usher Pavilion. The Chairman, Mrs. Heatley, welcomed parishioners to the meeting and thanked them for attending. Also in attendance were Parish Councillors Mrs. G. A'Bear, Mr. M. Beasley, Mrs. T. Carr, Mr. S. Diffey, Mr. A. Murch, Mr. D. Nichols, Mrs. J. Savage and Mrs. L. Waylen. Apologies were received from Mr. P. Manning.

Mrs. Heatley reported that, at the PC meeting prior to the Annual Meeting, she had been re-elected Chairman for the coming year, with Mrs. Thelma Carr being re-elected as Vice-Chairman.

The Chairman reported on activity by the Parish Council during the past year:

Spout Lane – The ditch by the caravan & camping club has finally been piped and filled in, and a useful lay by created. This has improved both the access and the appearance of this area of the lane.

Road signage, Martinslade – a meeting was arranged between the residents and Mark Stansby of Wiltshire Council. As a result, signs for Martinslade were reinstated.

Bench in Love Walk – The bench had fallen into disrepair and become unusable. Thanks to a generous anonymous donation, the bench was repaired and is now fit for use again in this peaceful area of the village.

Parish Council website – The PC now has its own website, linked to the village website, giving details of meeting dates and times, current planning applications and contact details for all Councillors. To date it has had over 4,300 hits.

Bollands Hill – has now been officially named as such.

website.

PC Allotments – These were cleared by Community Payback earlier in the year, and plots laid out. Four plots have been taken, and water is to be installed shortly. The site will also be weed sprayed to prevent it becoming overgrown again.

Rumble strips on A361 at eastern end of village – these were causing a noise nuisance to residents living close by, they were removed and the road made good.

Planning – Some 48 applications were considered by the PC during the year, including the application for a family golf centre on land in Berhills Lane. The PC reiterated its objections to the application, which was refused on the grounds of access and overhead power lines which are not low voltage. A notice of appeal was received in February and the PC responded to the appeal notice. **N.B.** The appeal was dismissed, and the notice is available to view on the PC

Elections – Two elections were held during the year. Steve Diffey was elected in May 2010 to replace Mike Davis, and Tony Murch was elected in March 2011 to replace Nick Haines who resigned as he was moving out of the village.

Highway Matters – This remains a regular item and is regularly reviewed, especially traffic speed, the use of Smiley SIDS, potholes and general road maintenance. Safety issues such as the bend at the western end of the High Street by Wesley Cottage, school signage for both ends of School Road and the old railway bridge in Station Road are being pursued.

On-going items – includes the refurbishment of the War Memorial in the churchyard; the PC is applying for a grant towards the cost of this work.

The Chairman reported that, at the earlier PC meeting, it had been agreed to form a small sub-committee to review planning applications. This was felt to be a better way to review planning applications prior to PC meetings. The Chairman is Darren Nichols, and the other members are Thelma Carr and Tony Murch. Applications will be reviewed initially by the Planning Committee and any possible problems highlighted. Applications will then come to the next PC meeting for a review by the full PC and for their vote before comments are returned to the Planning Department. Planning applications will be available to view 20 minutes before the start of PC meetings.

Reports were then given by the Lye Field Committee, the Cricket Club, Neighbourhood Watch, the Community Centre, Seend Fête, the WI and Seend Shuttle.

The PC meeting held on 28th June was attended by six Councillors, with Mrs. A. Heatley in the Chair. Also in attendance, Cllr. J. Seed and a member of the public. Apologies received from Mrs. G. A'Bear, Mr. M. Beasley, Mr. S. Diffey, Mr. D. Nicholls and Mrs L. Waylen.

Items for Discussion from Members of the Parish

Mr. Goman raised the issue of the relocation of the postal sorting office from Melksham to Chippenham, and stated that this would make things difficult for parishioners who needed to collect items from the sorting office. The Clerk to write to Royal Mail to ask what provision is being made for people living in Seend to collect items locally. It was suggested that it would be easier for people living in Seend to collect from Devizes rather than Chippenham, because of transport links.

Matters arising

War Memorial – The Clerk had obtained a further quote for cleaning and restoration work to the memorial. Cllr. Seed suggested that a bid could be put in to the Area Board for funding towards this cost, although this should be undertaken by the British Legion or Seend PCC, rather than the PC. The Clerk to contact both organisations to assist one of them to make a bid for funding.

Allotments – The allotments have now been sprayed. The letting agreement was agreed, and will be passed to tenants, and their rent collected.

Love Walk, replacement of stone steps – There was still no detail of the cost of replacement for the stone steps from ROW. The Clerk to obtain a quote from Longs for replacement/repair of the stone steps.

Canal Bridge, Barge Inn –E-mail sent to Canal Officer, who has contacted British Waterways. Response received from Richard Leigh, Principal Waterway Engineer, to advise that the following checks are made on the bridge:

- * Each month a length inspector carries out a visual check of the bridge to look for changes in its condition
- * Every 3 months measurements are taken to check the rate of movement on the bridge
- * Each year the bridge is inspected by a qualified engineer
- * Every 10 years a detailed Principal Inspection is undertaken by a qualified bridge engineer. The latest inspection was completed in May 2011.

Based on current inspections, imminent intervention is not considered necessary. This is subject to review and may change if the bridge deteriorates further. The Clerk to request a copy of the Principal Inspection undertaken in May 2011.

E-mail also received from Russ Bennett, Enforcement Officer South, to advise that he had checked data from 1 May 2011, and can only see that a couple of boats remained on site for longer than the permitted time. Data Checkers cycle the entire K & A on a weekly basis and boats not moving in accordance with BW guidelines are dealt with accordingly.

Highway Matters – The Clerk to obtain the cost of a grit bin, and to request a tonne of salt/grit to be supplied, if agreement could be obtained for storage under cover. Still awaiting information on whether traffic calming measures can be put in place at the west end of the High Street by Wesley Cottage. Clerk to ask CATG if a flashing sign or solid white lines with visual narrowing can be introduced in this area. Parking just inside The Lye turning was discussed, Cllr Seed advised that parking restrictions in residential areas are very unpopular. The footpath along the A361 from The Bell to The Stocks is now being cleared.

Old Railway Bridge, Station Road – Mrs Carr had attended the CATG meeting on 27 June. Following the fatal road accident at the bridge, the Coroner made a number of recommendations for highway improvements. It was proposed to introduce solid edge lines over the bridge to provide a visual narrowing, to encourage greater caution, and place a revised chevron board which can be seen on the approach to the bridge. A reply had been received to the issue about speeding on Bollands Hill; the council does not carry out metro counts in 60 mph speed limits as community speed watch and SIDs cannot operate here.

Public Enquiry, footpath – Still awaiting the result from the Planning Inspectorate.

Barbara Booth's legacy – Response received from the Community Centre, Lye Field Committee and the School to advise they would like to have trees. The Clerk to contact Tom Ashpole and Trevor Hale to ask about costs of obtaining trees and planting.

Rusty Lane - Clerk to chase British Waterways for a reply to our request for a sign to be placed where Rusty Lane joins the canal, pointing to the shop and

Post Office. Also liaise with Cllr Seed to find out if this can be obtained through an Issue at the Melksham Area Board.

Melksham Area Board

Mrs Savage reported that the Melksham Campus will remain in Melksham, at the site of Melksham House. The date of the next Area Board is 14 July at Riverside Club, Melksham; it will be an older persons' special.

Village Appraisal

Mr Murch advised that 800 copies had been produced, plus spares. Organisations taking part include the School, the WI, Lye Field, Community Centre and the Church. Forms will be delivered between the 1st and 8th July to everyone over 18. They will then be collected at the end of July, forms will then be analysed. The question of costings was discussed and it was felt fair to divide the costs pro-rata to the number of pages allocated to each organisation. It was agreed to invite Marion Rayner from Community First to attend prior to the

Keevil School News

Never a morning passes without a grand announcement about education. It's so important in amongst all that to remember that one is dealing with young lives. What really matters is to make these small people love learning and understand the doors that love can open.

I've been here a year now: what a year. The Wiltshire Warm and Well Scheme has been set up to increase substantially the number of well insulated homes throughout Wiltshire. Grants are available for loft and cavity



wall insulation. Wiltshire Council has teamed up the Severn Wye Energy Agency and the contractor Domestic and General Insulation Ltd to deliver the scheme, which is available to all home owners or those who rent privately (with their landlord's permission) even if you work or have a private pension. There may be a cost to pay but the price is reduced substantially through the scheme (subject to survey).

Householders may be eligible to have the work done free of charge (subject to survey) if:

- They are over 60.
- · They receive certain benefits.
- They earn less than £16,000 gross each year.
- They have school-age children and earn less than £22,000 gross each year.
