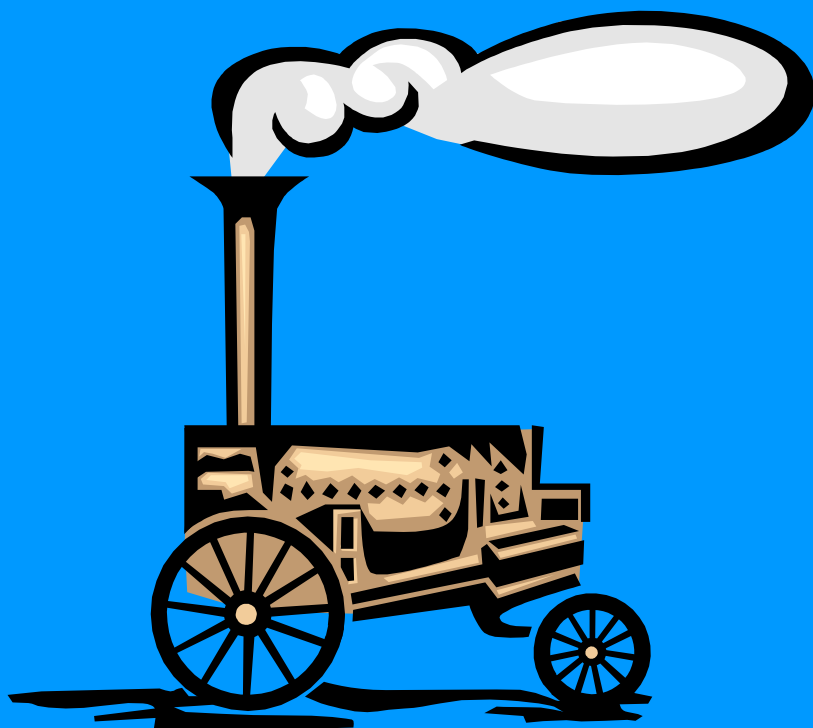

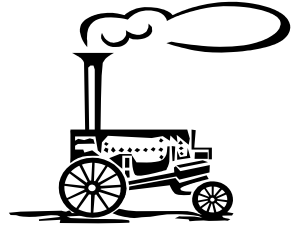

Welcome to the July issue

The Seend Traction Engine Rallies



This month sees the 40th anniversary of the first of the Traction Engine Rallies that raised most of the money that enabled the village to purchase the Lye Field as a recreation area, and then to build the Irene Usher Memorial Pavilion. From a booklet compiled by John Smallshaw in 1993, we have drawn together some facts about these momentous occasions.

The search for a recreational space for the village began in earnest in 1962, when there were complaints about young people hanging around on the corner of the Lye because there was nothing else for them to do. 13-year-old Sue Vowles, better known to us as Sue Holloway (sorry to give your age away, Sue, but it's a chance for everyone to say 'You really don't look it!') collected signatures for a petition asking for a playing field. The adults soon joined in the campaign, appealing to the then Devizes Rural District Council for help.

Meanwhile local policeman P.C. Perry, aided by Gwyn Hopkins, stepped into the breach by organising a social evening in the WI Hall for 12- to 17-year-olds in the village that ended with 'dancing to music by a record player'.

The Lye Field, being fairly central, was seen as a likely site for a playing field. At that time it was farmed, but the owner of the land wanted to sell it for housing development. A voluntary committee, chaired by Mr Archie Kidd, was able to gain some grant funding and a bank loan enabling them to purchase the field for £5,500 in 1967 - but that was only the beginning. A lot more cash - and voluntary labour - was needed to turn the field into a recreation area and, of course, the bank loan had to be repaid. Various fund-raising schemes were put into practice, such as skittles matches, whist drives, raffles and so on. Then 'Fowler' Jack Holloway, a resident of the Lye, came up with the idea of organising a traction engine rally. As his nickname suggests, he was a steam engine enthusiast and had a lot of useful knowledge and contacts.

The venue was found - the field on the Bath Road belonging to Mr John Cottle, and the volunteer committee discovered what a huge job they had taken on! Publicity and programmes had to be printed (long before desktop publishing existed!), and parking, security, fuel supplies, insurance, fencing, refreshments and toilets all had to be organised. Entertainment to organise included pony rides, merry-go-rounds and trailer rides. Phone lines had to be installed on the field. To add to the pressures, bad weather meant the field was under water just two weeks before the event.

Eventually, on the weekend of 27th-28th July 1968, a large collection of showman's tractors, steam rollers, agricultural steam tractors, a steam fire-engine, vintage cars, steam-powered fairground organs etc made their way to the field. One engine steamed here all the way from Scotland! There were also sheep-dog displays and ploughing demonstrations.

20,000 people came along and paid 2/6d (12½p) to get in. A pint of beer cost 3/- (15p) and a cup of tea 4d (2p). The day made a profit of £2,733. The queue for the car park caused traffic hold-ups as far back as Shaw one way and the outskirts of Devizes the other. The police had to intervene. Bib Mayell was stopped from collecting parking fees at the entrance and instead had to chase around after the drivers to get their money before they disappeared into the crowds! Other anecdotes include a tale of injuries caused by over-zealous use of bleach to clean the toilets, Gerald Muller transporting a live duck on the pillion of his motorbike, and the takings being stashed under Archie Kidd's bed.

Experience gained at this first rally ensured smoother operations at the four subsequent rallies; the last one was held in 1972. Enough money was raised to turn the field into the sports and recreation area it is today, including the building of the Pavilion in 1973 at a cost of £16,250. You can see items related to the rallies inside the Pavilion.

The original voluntary committee evolved into today's Lye Field Committee, with representatives from affiliated village organisations. In 1973 the village fete took over the entertainment and fund-raising niche vacated by the rallies. Knowing how much community spirit and team effort went into acquiring the Lye Field and Pavilion all those years ago, it is even more sad to read the item on page 6 about the uncertain future of the village fete.

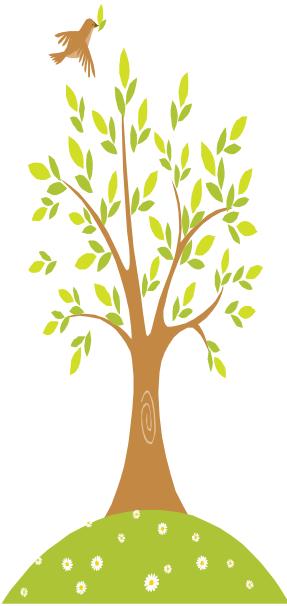

SEEND SUMMER FETE - AN UNCERTAIN FUTURE **An important announcement to Seend**

Seend Summer Fete 2008, due to take place on Saturday 9th August may very well be the last Seend Fete for some time. The current Chair and at least three other members are resigning from the committee following this year's Fete, leaving just four committee members to carry on. These four have made it absolutely clear that unless at least four new members – including a Chair - join the committee before the end of 2008, they too will leave. Without an organising committee there will be no Fete in 2009.

Despite numerous written appeals and personal approaches over the years, there seems to be a collective reluctance to get involved in the Fete planning organisation, and while the present committee members have been prepared to extend their tenure for 'just one more year', the show has gone on. But the sands are finally running out and we as a village must now seriously contemplate life after the Last Fete.

All of us who live in Seend know how much the Fete means to us and to the hundreds of visitors from other villages in this part of Wiltshire. It's an event which we love, and of which we are immensely proud, demonstrating as it does our togetherness in spirit and community.

The support we get for the event is absolutely remarkable, from the local families and businesses who sponsor us with cash donations – this year to the tune of £2,700 – to local businesses and organisations who pay for advertising space in a programme with a fairly small (600 or so) circulation - £1,300 so far this year – to the dozens of volunteer-helpers who turn up on the day to 'build' and run the Fete. If we lose the Fete, we lose this support as well - and we may never get all of it back.

When given a choice of doing something or doing nothing, we all know how much easier is to do nothing. But right now in Seend, doing nothing is not really an option.

I am aware that many of you when you read this will think "I don't think I have the ability to organise something as big as the Fete." Well, you might be surprised to learn that this thought was shared by all members of the present committee and I would guess by all previous committee members. The reality is that as individuals we may not have that skill, but as members of a small team with a job to do, we soon learn it. If you want evidence of this, consider the success of the fete over the past 38 years!

There is no secret to this success, but if there were, it would be the second thought that occurred to all the men and women who have formed the Fete committees over the years – "But it can't be all that difficult. After all, the last lot did it!"

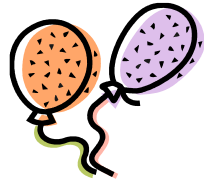
Well, at the moment, it looks like we **are** the last lot, but what we have achieved over the last 3 years we have achieved with application, determination and teamwork, plus a considerable amount of support and assistance. And we have had a lot of fun. Fete meetings are not business meetings, although we do get the job done. They are social occasions too, where a glass of something is occasionally enjoyed, where frequent

(sometimes too frequent) digressions into other topics occur, and where eight different people of differing views and characteristics blend into - in Captain Mainwaring's immortal words - 'a finely-honed fighting machine'. Quite a transformation from the eight individuals who at some point in time thought "I don't think I have the ability to organise something as big as the Fete." - but nevertheless, gave it a go! Why don't you?

Tea-tent: The large marquee will be staffed as last year, by members of the Rambling Club who will be providing Fete Refreshments in the form of home-made cakes, confectionaries, tea, coffee and soft drinks, all to be enjoyed in the comfort and elegance of the Fete Tea-Room.

From where I stand...

FROM ROY

The idea of describing the Christian life as a journey is one that has appealed to people down through the ages. It is deeply rooted in the Bible. Abram is called to leave his home and go to a country that God is showing him. Slaves in Egypt journey across the wilderness to the Promised Land. Exiles are promised they will return home. Jesus sets his face steadfastly to go to Jerusalem and we still talk of following the way of the cross. Early Christians were described as people of the way. John Bunyan wrote A Pilgrims Progress as an understanding of the Christian life (interestingly he wrote a story of a journey while he was imprisoned in Bedford Gaol and it was a picture of a stained glass window of A Pilgrims Progress that sustained Terry Waite while he was in prison). Christians still go on pilgrimages today to Glastonbury, to the Holy Land and many other places. All these journeys real or metaphorical are attempts to help us understand that the real journey we make is into the heart of God. Sidney Carter, the modern hymn writer, in his well known hymn invites us to pray, 'keep me travelling along with you.' I'm glad we are going on a journey in Seend at the end of this month around each of the four churches in Seend, Bulkington and Poulshot when we become Safari Church. It's a good way of affirming that we are all on the same journey together in search of God, although the reality is in the end God finds us. I encourage you to come and join us starting at Holy Cross in Seend at 10 a m on 27th July. May our journey together lead us to the heart of God.

SEEND WOMEN'S INSTITUTE

Our meeting, held on 11 June 2008, was dedicated to the issue of the future of Seend WI Hall and land.



Seend Women's Institute decided, by a majority, that the land would not be sold. This means that the land in Rusty Lane is protected from development.

Our meeting began with a site visit where members were able to see for themselves that the hall is, in fact, in a reasonable condition. It is not, as some thought, condemned or dangerous.

We have not yet made a final decision as to exactly what we are going to do with the hall. There are two options available to us - to remove the hall and revert the land to allotments, or restore it to a community facility. To bring the hall back into community use will require significant improvements to be made and therefore the committee was mandated to investigate the detailed pros and cons of these options, including financial viability.

Grant funding might be available, which would help in the event that the hall is kept. But, of course, there are other resource issues such as the management and running costs, which would need to be met by income from hiring. We need to investigate the viability in financial and management terms before presenting this as a realistic option.

The Committee will consult with the Community Centre and Lye Field who are organisations which have a direct interest in the future of the WI Hall. However, if you have strong views on the future of the hall, please feel free to send your comments to me or to the secretary Susan Bolton. We welcome comments from either sex!

We are hoping that the difficulties of recent years are now behind us. The Committee wants to work together with both new and longstanding members, to continue to build a vibrant, interesting and supportive Women's Institute for the ladies in our community.

Our next meeting takes place on Wednesday 9 July when we will have a talk about growing vegetables. The competition will be an 'unusual shaped vegetable'. It is also hoped that a final decision on the future of the hall will be made.

We hope very much that you will want to come and join us.
