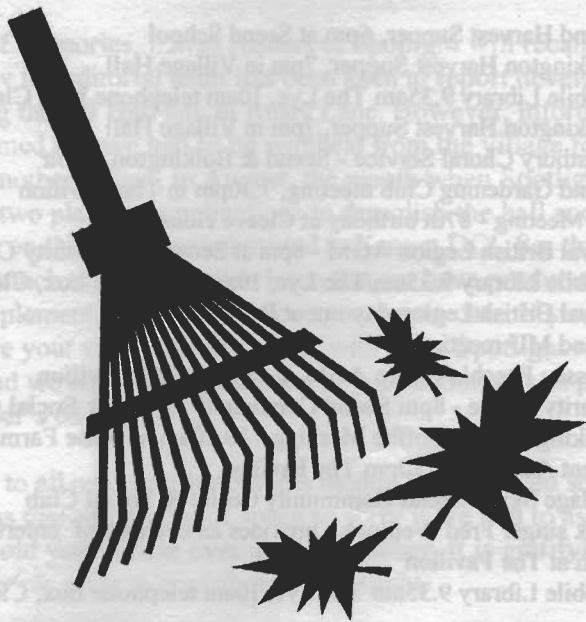

VILLAGE NEWS

WI HALL

There are currently two planning applications with Kennet District Council: one for *the demolition of the WI Hall* and the second for *the removal of the WI Hall and replacement with 2 dwellings with garages*. Whilst the WI Hall has not yet been sold, the planning applications have been submitted by the Estate Agents acting on behalf of the Trustees of the WI Hall.

Anyone wishing to comment, needs to do so within 21 days of the submission date of 4th September (it might already be too late for the demolition application as we think the deadline for this is 19th September). The Parish Council are asking for an extension to the consultation period, but this is yet to be confirmed. The Planning Application reference numbers are K/54973/CAC (demolition) and K/55043/F (development). The plans can be viewed on their website: www.kennet.gov.uk or by visiting Kennet District Council Offices, Browfort, Bath Road, Devizes SN10 2AT on weekdays from 9am-5pm..

This is the village's main opportunity to voice its concern over the future of WI Hall site and to question how any development would effect the Seend Community Centre and Social Club and the Irene Usher Hall. If you have an opinion, you should voice it before it is too late!

The matter was discussed at the Parish Council Meeting on 30th August, the minutes of which are in this issue of Spotlight.

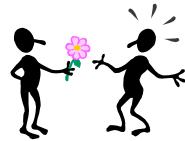


LADIES' EVENING - 18TH NOVEMBER

From Where I Stand...

...preparing a quiz or treasure hunt means you have to look very carefully for clues! I was asked to create a quiz for people to do while visiting Holy Cross Seend during our Patronal Festival weekend in September. In any church the Patronal Festival is like one big birthday party usually kept around the date in the year when the saint or name dedication given to the church is celebrated. In our Benefice St Peter's Poulshot have theirs at the end of June when St Peter and St Paul are remembered and Christ Church Bulkington now have theirs on a day in November called the Feast of Christ the King. Holy Cross Day is 14th September and celebrates the way in which the whole Christian Church has come to see the cross on which Jesus was crucified as the symbol for the Christian faith journey.

Like any birthday style celebration the time is meant to give thanks for the years passed and look with hope to the future. The church gives thanks for the generations of those who have worshipped there before us, looking forward with hope for the future, being aware of our responsibilities to care for both the church and be part of building the community in the parish around us...

So as part of the preparation for the Holy Cross weekend I started to think about this treasure hunt quiz... Finding the clues meant carefully looking around the church, at the windows, the memorial plaques, the stonework... Many of the windows have stained glass images of saints like St John and St Paul, as well as Mary and Jesus, and saints linked with Salisbury Cathedral, like St Osmund and St Aldhelm, as well as women's names from the Bible like Dorcas and Lydia. There's also the great Millennium window with scenes from the Seend area like the canal and the farmland. The memorial stones

remember the names of generous church benefactors over several centuries who have given bequests of money for the life of the church and the parish.

From where I stand, looking for clues for the quiz, it seemed to me that when looking at other people's lives we can often tell something about our own. The saints were people who knew their need of God, and followed Him, pointing others to discover Him too. They gave something of themselves, took seriously the need to get to know God better, and saw the benefits of this experience. The local church benefactors were ordinary people, part of the life of the church and community, who wanted to see the church and its work continue. All these names represent the people of the past for whom the church was important, for whatever reason, and they gave something of themselves not only to help the upkeep of the church building but as living stones being part of the church and community life.

The church is not a museum but a living breathing evolving place of worship and nurturing faith just as the Christian faith is not a static once only fact provable by logic or debate but is an evolving experience, a spiritual resource, within our inner being. Really 'the church' is far more than its building and it is the people who live out their faith in the community around them, being living stones, just like the names on the windows and stones, taking their turn in building up and sharing our neighbourhood and village life. The whole village community shares in the puzzle of how we can do this together, looking for clues to our future - for it is building a community of love that isn't just the mission of God but it is for us all!

Perhaps many of us could find time to pause like this for a 'stand and stare' moment, to allow one experience to lead us to other reflections and realisations. In that place of pausing and reflecting we can journey a long way and may begin to sense the presence of God and so be led to see Him more clearly and find ways of knowing Him more deeply.

Alas Wantage is in the Thames water area and as a result of the hosepipe ban, the garden was in a very parched state. However it was a pleasant place to have a picnic while the sun shone and some of us had time to hit the shops as well!

WELCOME TO THE SEEND & DISTRICT LINK SCHEME

This scheme is open to all persons within the area covered by Spotlight. There may well be people who have moved into the area in the past year or two who may not be aware of what we are and what we do, so I thought a little reminder would be appropriate.

The Link Scheme is run entirely by volunteers to assist members of our community who need help with transport, a little assistance with daily living tasks to make life easier, or a little companionship. The following guidelines are intended to advise you in making requests for the help you need and ensure as many people as possible can be helped.

All requests for help should be made with at least 2 working days notice to the Co-ordinator on duty on 01380 828190. Short notice requests can sometimes be met but more often it is not possible to find a volunteer. The Co-ordinator is generally available from 9am until 4-30pm Monday to Friday. Emergencies only at the weekend.

Help is for those:

- * who are without their own transport;
- * who are unable to use public transport;
- * where no public transport or other service, for example the ambulance car service, is available;
- * people who have mobility problems who cannot use public transport; and if no one else is available to take you.

Please tell the Co-ordinator: - if you need assistance with walking eg you use a stick or a frame; if you need a wheelchair; if you want to take someone with you; any medical details you consider important.

Please mention all the details of your visit and any extra stops eg for shopping on your way back.

Please remember to cancel a request if you no longer need help. Acceptance of a request is always subject to the availability of a volunteer. The Co-ordinator may be able to direct you to another agency which could provide you with a more suitable service.

When you receive a service the volunteer will ask you if you would like to make a donation. You will be given an envelope in which you may place an anonymous donation. These donations are used to pay costs and volunteers' expenses. The Link Scheme has a Public Liability Insurance policy. Your details will be held confidentially and never disclosed to a third party.

We are here to help and we hope all present users and future users will be happy with the service we provide.

It was decided to offer the allotments rent-free for two years, to enable tenants to clear the plots. Once the plots had been taken up, the water would be installed.

The PC discussed the future of the WI Hall, following on from earlier in the year when it was learned that Seend WI were considering selling the site. It was agreed that the Clerk should write to Wansbroughs Solicitors, acting for the WI, to ascertain the current position.

A request was received from a parishioner in attendance at the meeting, that hedging adjacent to the High Street from School Road to the shop, be cut back, as it reduced the footpath available for pedestrians, which could be dangerous with the amount of heavy traffic using the road. He also pointed out that the tactile flooring at School Road, and in the High Street between the bus stops by Weavers Cottages was overgrown, causing a problem for partially sighted persons relying on these indicators at the edges of the road. The Clerk to write to Wiltshire CC and householders concerned.

DISCUSSION OF WI HALL PLANNING APPLICATIONS

The August meeting was attended by 9 Councillors, with Mrs. Savage in the Chair.

Prior to the formal Parish Council meeting, there was an open meeting, attended by 42 members of the public. This was to discuss the planning application relating to the demolition of the WI Hall and replacement with two dwellings and garages.

Presentations were given by Mr. Peter Fisher, Mr. John Smallshaw and Mr. Philip Proven. These presentations raised various concerns.

- Whether the WI land and buildings have been sold and, if so, whether they were sold in accordance with the terms expressed by the donor in the original Declaration of Trust.
- The future financial viability of the Community Centre & Social Club if occupants of the new dwellings sought to restrict noise and any form of pollution from events held in the Centre.
- The loss of the allotments from April 2007, and whether any alternative comparable allotment space is being provided.
- Parking, passing and turning of vehicles in Rusty Lane, and the loss of a significant number of parking spaces once the new dwellings were built, and the attendant problems of parking elsewhere in the village, or along the High Street.

Several other parishioners expressed concerns about the loss of the allotments; the loss of parking along Rusty Lane; the safety aspects of loss of parking for groups using the Pavilion, such as mothers and toddlers; the fact that the Lye Field and Rusty Lane are the social and amenity area of the village and the erection of new dwellings on the land would involve a change of use; who would benefit from the development compared with the loss to the village of the amenity of the WI Hall.

The Chairman, Mrs. Savage, said that the comments and concerns expressed would be passed to Kennet District Council and the Trustees of the WI Hall.

Whether you decide to vote or not is up to you but if you’re not registered you have no choice and non-registration may adversely affect your credit rating status.”

VILLAGE BITS’N’BOBS

SEEND VILLAGE LIFE - THEN AND NOW!

Picture this. The year is 1919, the First World War has ended in 1918 and, on October 8th 1919, Seend Womens’ Institute was formed and meetings were held in the “Iron Room”. Under the leadership of their President, Miss. Dorothy Heward Bell, the members put their heads together to try to resolve the problem of a need for a hall to hold meetings, dances and concerts. In February 1920 the President reported that she had heard of an army hut for sale which might be suitable as a Hall. She asked the permission of the members to go and inspect it and – if it proved a good one – to authorise her to buy it on behalf of the W. I. The money for the purpose should be borrowed from the bank. This was agreed to.

Thanks to Mr. W. Heward Bell J.P. it was not long before the army hut was purchased, transported, and re-erected in the village on land given by him. On Saturday December 18th 1920 the Hall was opened by Squire Bell. The purchase price was £180 plus £90 to move it from Salisbury Plain. The total cost, with re-erection etc. amounted to £497.19.6d. The members had raised £269.6s. – leaving a bank overdraft of £256.6.6d

Fund raising came from a Grand Fete and Baby Show, Dances, another Fete and Flower Show, joint W I & Royal British Legion Skittles week. Meanwhile good progress had been made and membership on October 20th 1920 numbered 90. The Annual subscription was 2 shillings and each member must bring 2 buns or a small cake and sugar (if taken) to meetings. They celebrated their first Birthday with a lecture on refooting old stockings and how to select poultry for breeding!

Over the years refreshments have progressed to Strawberries & Cream, Buffet Suppers, Tea & biscuits and Birthdays celebrated with a two course meal and Birthday cake followed by entertainment.

In June 1923 the Tennis Courts (now allotments) alongside the Hall were opened by Miss Bell and, with a membership of 37, they were well attended each evening – even allowing men to join the Tennis Committee. On July 12th 1923 Miss. Dorothy Heward Bell married Mr. H. C. Hony and moved to live near Winchester, and so we said farewell to our beloved President.

Over the years the Institute carried on under new Presidents and during the Second World War there was a lending library in the Hall. When the war ended the WI supported the servicemen by holding ‘Welcome Home’ parties. Fund raising continued holding Dances, Plant Sales, Whist Drives, etc. Hirings included Wedding Receptions, a Baby Clinic, 60+ Club, Youth Club, Cub and Scout meetings, Auctions, Play Group (Before the Pavilion was built!) and then came the “Saturday Morning Breakfasts” for 38 years – providing a service and raising the not inconsiderable funds needed to pay for the Hall repairs and running costs.

Picture this. The year is 2006 and a lot of water has flowed under the bridge. We live in a world of gadgets, Political Correctness, Rules for this that and everything else. A First World War army hut cannot compete with modern buildings built to comply with the rules, rising costs and membership of 18. Annual subscription is £22 and rising each year; we can no longer continue with Breakfasts to raise the necessary funds so, with dwindling income the members have reluctantly decided to move out in September and hold future meetings in Seend School - commencing in November.

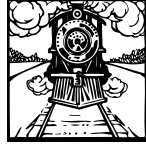
Our 87th Birthday will be celebrated on October 11th this year at Cleeve House – the home of our first President, Miss. Bell.

The future of Seend WI Hall is uncertain, but we will have many happy memories to cherish as time goes by.

GREAT BULKINGTON RAILWAY

Bulkington Village Hall awarded Second Lottery Grant this year. Who said that lightning never strikes in the same place twice?



In January 2006 Bulkington Village Hall received a grant from Awards for All for £4,272 for a new suspended ceiling and storage shed. In July 2006 (only three weeks after applying!) we received a Second Award of £3,708 to pay for a tarmac approach/car park at the front of the hall. Just under £8,000 in total in one year!

The Management Committee Chairman Nev Boulton is ‘Over The Moon’ and somewhat amazed at this second grant. “It really is like winning the Lotto twice! We have worked so very hard at restoring our village hall – Some three years ago we nearly lost it. We raised a lot of money ourselves with an Auction of Promises and steam train rides to see Santa. We have fitted a new floor, had the walls re-pointed, re-plastered inside, new window, a new suspended ceiling & lighting, a disabled toilet and exterior ramp and new electrics. It is really smart inside and the new tarmac approach will finish the job.”

The Chernobyl Children Visit to Bulkington Friday 04 August. A group of around 10 girls (and their UK host families) from the atomic Chernobyl disaster area visited the Great Bulkington ‘sit-on-and-ride’ Railway on Friday on 4th August 2006. The West Wiltshire Society of Model Engineers provided the locomotive crews plus the steam and diesel engines, which gave the children rides on the railway. By the end of the afternoon all the girls (many of whom had been orphaned by the disaster) were driving the railway engines. Around 4pm the children adjourned to the recently refurbished Bulkington Village Hall for a tea party provided by villagers led by Liz Futter. We had been instructed not to offer them any dairy products because dairy foods in Belarus are still contaminated by radiation and the children must not get in the habit of eating them.

To All Donators at the Memorial Services for Mo Laycock

I would like to take this opportunity to thank you all so much for your donation to Mum’s Memorial Fund. I know it will mean a great deal to the children at Al Athan School in Sri Lanka. As so many of the donations were anonymous I wanted to ensure that everybody knew their contribution was greatly appreciated.

So far we have managed to raise a staggering £3,300.00! I’m sure Mum would be amazed at this total. It really has been a comforting process to organise this fund and to see something so good come from such a tragic few months.

Currently I am in contact with the Headteacher of the school to find out what they would like to spend the money on. I want to ensure that all of your donations are used for something permanent that current and future pupils will benefit from, that will also act as a lasting tribute to Mum. The kinds of things that we are discussing are computer equipment, a new minibus, some playground equipment or establishing a small farm to enable the children to learn animal husbandry and farming skills. We also intend a small amount to go into individual bank accounts that have been set up for the children. This will give them a small pot of savings to draw upon in future life.

My intention was to take all of the donations out to the school myself in November, but due to work commitments I think I will have to postpone my trip until 2007. In the meantime I will liaise with the school to arrange for the funds to be wired to them as soon as possible so that they can put the money to good use.

PAST TIMES – Frenny & Violet Hughes

Frenny and Violet's parents were both Romany Travellers who used to come through Bulkington in their horse drawn caravan to graze their horses on the Drove. They liked Bulkington so much that they decided to settle down here. They bought a piece of land opposite the War Memorial and built a bungalow on it. Frenny and Violet's brother, Michael, had a Wood Yard which was situated near to where the Bus Shelter now stands. When Violet's Mother died they burnt her caravan down the Drove and all the travellers from far and wide came to Bulkington for the wake. Frenny and Violet came back and forth to Bulkington, but still liked their caravan life so they bought a site near Swindon and much of their time was spent there. Both were very colourful characters – Frenny travelled all over the world, and Violet would carry all her worldly possessions with her in her bag, (gold sovereigns etc) even when going into the pub! When Frenny died Violet had a vault built for his grave according to the custom of the Romany Travellers. They are buried together, in the Churchyard, with a pure gold cross in their grave.
